The Chilterns Conservation Board

Beacons of the Past is a 3.5-year project, partfunded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, to investigate, conserve and help people to explore the hillforts and other prehistoric archaeology of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The project began in Spring 2018 and has delivered the UK's largest high-resolution archaeological survey produced by LiDAR, which uses laser technology from aircraft to build a highly accurate topographical model of the Chilterns landscape, showing us the lumps and bumps of archaeological sites, even under woodland and undergrowth.

The project provides a springboard for community and public involvement through:

- Surveying and researching known hillforts, and searching for previously undiscovered archaeology in densely wooded areas using LiDAR technology;
- Improving interpretation of the hillforts and their landscapes, encouraging people to visit and enjoy them;
- Bringing the Iron Age to life through events and educational activities;
- Undertaking practical works to improve the condition and accessibility of known and newly discovered sites.
