

Amersham Museum

Amersham Museum works closely with the Amersham Society, which was instrumental in its establishment. The museum is housed in a late medieval hall house and the neighbouring Victorian building, on the High Street in Old Amersham. The museum includes permanent displays about the history of the local area, a temporary exhibition and activity space and a wonderful herb garden. Town walks start from the museum on Sunday afternoons and will recommence in Spring 2022. Tudor walks are on the last Saturday of the month and will restart in Spring 2022. See the Amersham Museum website for further details. Pre-booked groups and school parties are welcome throughout the year.
